

## **PRIORITY** The Top 4 Priorities for Spokane County GUIDE

**SPOKANE** This assessment was conducted between September 2022 and May 2023 by Priority Spokane and its 27 member organizations, Spokane Trends, Spokane Regional Health District, and the Junior League of Spokane. Over 1,700 votes were cast for priorities by informed participants in Spokane County.

1	To improve public safety, provide greater access to services/resources for patients with mental health needs.	Adults reporting poor mental health through 2020 show a nearly 50% increase. It is likely that when the 2022 survey is released, the estimate will be higher than 17% of all adults. 5.3.2, SpokaneTrends.org
2	Build out local capacity for childcare to boost the economy.	The number of childcare providers in Spokane County dropped from 277 in 2015 to 245 in 2020 despite the need for childcare only growing. ChildCare Aware of Washington, www.childcareawarewa.org
3. TIE	Increase the tree canopy to improve the environment, counteract dangerous heat days, improve air and water quality, etc.	Spokane County has seen a 725% increase in the number of dangerous high heat days since 2000. 4.2.9, SpokaneTrends.org
3. TIE	Promote housing innovations such as shared equity housing, tiny homes, and co-operative living to address housing issues.	The housing affordability index for first time home buyers in Spokane County in 2022 was 51 decreasing from 100.9 in 2017 (51=51% able to afford first time home buying). 6.3.6, SpokaneTrends.org

## Prioritization Criteria (in no particular order)

An issue that affects the greatest number of residents.

An issue that has a disproportionate impact across subpopulations.

A condition that is unambiguously below or above where we want it to be.

A condition that we want to preserve.

An indicator that is predictive of other outcomes and positively impacts several goals.

A condition that we, locally, have some opportunity to change.

An issue we can impact in 3-5 years.

**The Process:** Two community assessment meetings were held in each of the six topic areas (Economy, Education, Environment, Health, Housing, and Public Safety). Participants were asked to review local data indicators and identify what information was still needed to make educated recommendations on priorities for Spokane County. The indicators requested, when available, were presented at the second meetings (visit www.SpokaneTrends.org to see the data selected). These indicators were used by over 300 participants to make informed recommendations on potential priorities. The public was then invited to review the nominated priorities for each of the six topic areas and vote on their top two to create a top 12 priorities for Spokane County. Additionally, these results were presented at a series of 8 focus groups held with community groups across Spokane County to obtain their feedback (see reverse side). In May of 2023, the community came together to hear pitches from community experts on each of the top 12 priorities and cast their votes for the final top 3 featured in this document. Due to a tie, a top 4 was ultimately chosen.
